THE POWER OF THE RESURRECTION

What would you think of a story that ended like this: "and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid"? If you're anything like me, you'd probably think that this is the sort of ending that really needs to be followed with the words: "To be continued..."; and yet this is the ending Mark uses to finish his gospel in chapter 16 verse 8. So it isn't any wonder biblical translators of the second and fourth centuries tried to complete the Gospel of Mark with two other endings (a shorter and a longer) that now form an appendix at the end of the gospel. But neither the short nor long ending adequately fits the spirit and style of Mark's writing. So there are those who feel that if a choice has to be made, Mark should be known as "The Unfinished Gospel" with verse 8 as the last word.

But if the final page of his gospel wasn't accidentally lost, and Mark intentionally finished writing at the end of verse 8, what were his reasons for using such an abrupt ending? There are scholars who believe the answer can be found in the gospel itself and particularly in the first 8 verses of the last chapter (ch. 16). These verses begin with Mary Magdalen, Mary, the mother of James, and Salome going out when the Sabbath had ended to purchase burial spices so they could anoint Jesus' body, because, although Joseph of Arimathea had taken Jesus' body down and laid it in the tomb, it had not been fully prepared for burial. So, as soon as the Sabbath was over, these women returned to the tomb to finish the burial procedure. On arriving at the tomb they discover that the large stone used to seal the entrance had already been rolled back. And going inside they're shocked to see a white-robed angel, sitting on the right side, who says, "Don't be alarmed. You are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He isn't here! He has risen from the dead! Look, this is where they laid his body. Now go and tell his disciples, including Peter, that Jesus is going ahead of you to Galilee. You will see him there, just as He told you before He died." And the gospel then finishers with the words, "So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid." If this is where the Gospel of Mark truly ends, then what we have before us is a gospel that doesn't even give us a glimpse of the risen Lord—or does it? I ask this question because there are scholars who believe that the key to understanding this abrupt ending can be found in the words, "Jesus is going ahead of you to Galilee" (16:7); and that these words invite us to go back with the disciples to Galilee and find the power of the risen Lord in our very own lives by reading through the gospel again and again.

But any empowerment we receive from either Jesus Christ—the living Word of God—or the Scriptures—the written Word of God—will always come with an invitation not only to listen but also to speak. At the end of Mark's Gospel the women couldn't speak because they were too frightened. But we know that at some point they must have learnt to overcome their fear, and spoken to someone about what happen; otherwise what they saw would never have been written down.

Likewise we too can overcome any fears or reservations we might happen to have about working for God and his Kingdom. After we have prayed and listened, after we have looked to the community, to Jesus, and to the Scriptures—we can act, and act confidently. For it's God's good pleasure to give us an active part to play in His ever-changing world, as the good news of Jesus Christ continues through us.





There are only a few hymns from the hymn book that for me are particularly inspiring. To be honest, none of these hymns however spring to mind on a regular basis other than when at church on Saturday evening or Sunday morning. Cathedrals, well that's different. I find then nearly all inspiring and when visiting cities I visit the cathedrals whether they be one of "ours" or one of "theirs". I expected to encounter neither in a recent trip outback. Surprisingly I found myself encountering both in a recent awe inspiring trip to Katherine and the Kimberley's. I found myself recalling some of the songs and I attended 'church' a number of times, although at none of these was there a building. Some of the "songs" and "church" I experienced on my travels were:

Awesome Wonder

Flying low over the mountain beehives of the Bungle Bungles in a helicopter, and then later in a small plane over the deep gorges, waterfalls, rugged plateaus and ocean inlets from the vast Drysdale cattle station.

"O Lord my God when I in awesome wonder. Consider all the works thy hand has made...

Then sings my soul my saviour God to thee. How great thou art, how great thou art!

When I look down from lofty mountain (well aircraft) grandeur.."

Amazing Grace

At the end of a creek walk in the Bungle Bungles and at the end of cathedral gorge is the "cathedral" A sandy beach skirting a large pool, and overhead a angled ceiling of clean smooth rock, suspended and defying gravity. Big enough for St Peters and Westminster Abbey. A young mother sitting by the pool with her daughter began to sing "Amazing Grace" and stopped the activity of all within hearing. Whether she was religious, wanted to showcase the powerful acoustics, or both, it was indeed moving in such a perfect natural amphitheatre. "Amazing grace (how sweet the sound)"

Cathedrals and sacred places

A bend in the Kimberley Gorge where the river is wide and the water deep is the home of an aboriginal ancestor spirit. No fishing or swimming or loud noise but a place of peace and contemplation. Another day and at the end of a long walk along a creek in the midst of nowhere an aboriginal in time long ago has painted snakes, kangaroos and a spirit figure. At the ancient soaring "cathedral" in Cathedral gorge a 19th century religious ballad resonates, penned by the master of a slave ship saved by grace. At Windjana Gorge an aboriginal theatre group were rehearsing a musical tribute to Tudjimana, a freedom fighter shot dead at the nearby place, where tunnel creek emerges from its navigable cave through the mountain. The actor's backdrop are jagged spires many times higher than the opera house, and the lighting as the sun sank below the spires was a thousand stars, free from the light pollution of civilisation.


Back Home
